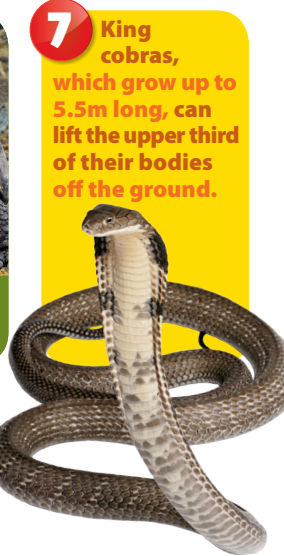

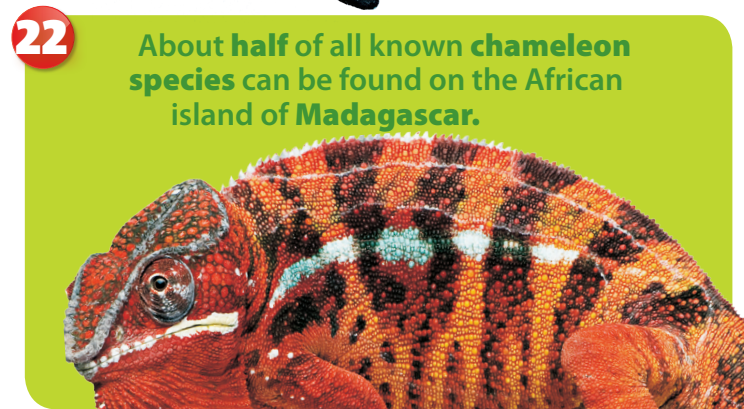

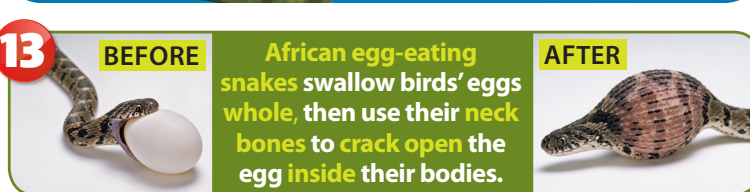

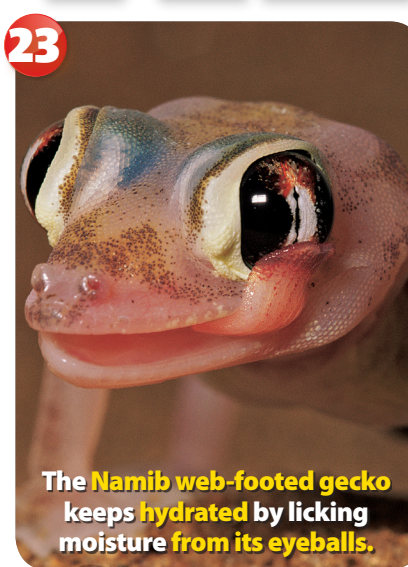

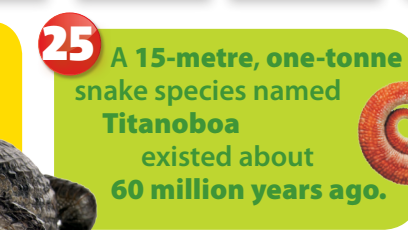

The eastern musk turtle is nicknamed 'STINKPOT' for the bad odour it emits to repel enemies.



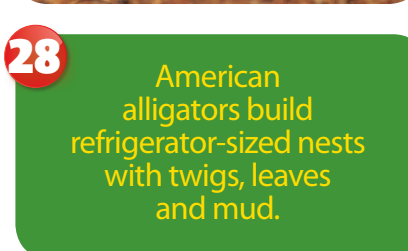
