Rio's costumes can be wild...




RIO rocks!
The world's biggest carnival happens every February in Rio de Janeiro. The four-day festival attracts thousands of people and fills the Brazilian city with parades, people in crazy costumes, and music and dancing.

Splash out
The Rio carnival started out in 1723 as a traditional Portuguese celebration, where people spent three days wearing masks and throwing water at each other! Things changed in 1840 when a hotel owner also decided to hold a spectacular party - and the carnival was born!

Supersamba
Nowadays, the carnival's highlight is a parade at the Sambadrome, a huge stadium where different samba schools fight for the title of Carnival Champion. The Samba is an energetic style of Brazilian music and dance, and with 3,000 - 5,000 dancers from each school, the parade has to be seen to be believed!
