> "I'm a volunteer for the Royal **National Lifeboat Institution** (RNLI) on the east coast of Scotland, and I'm in charge of the lifeboat when it's called out to sea.

This year, my crew and I were called out to help a couple that were trapped on their yacht. But this was no ordinary rescue, as we had to travel 60km out to sea in extremely strong winds and

with waves up to 12m high crashing over the top of the lifeboat. At one point, the lifeboat fell 10m off the top of a huge wave! But we kept going, and finally rescued the couple from their yacht. Now the whole crew's up for Gallantry awards.

It will be great to get the award, but knowing I've helped to save lives is the best feeling in the world!"
