# ANNAYANG FAGES

Check out these famous carvings and sculptures from other civilisations...

Easter Island, in the Pacific Ocean, has over 800 giant Moai scattered over it. The stone statues represent the ancestors of the islanders and are so heavy, nearly all the trees on the island were cut down to move them or logs over 700 years ago!



**TOTEM POLES, USA** These tall, wooden sculptures were carved by the indigenous people of the Pacific Northwest of America, to pass on their mythical stories to future generations. Made from tall cedar trees, some totem poles are over 50m high!

The Sumerian people, who lived in Mesopotamia (now Iraq) nearly 5,000 years ago, made elaborate death masks to be used in rituals and ceremonies. They were modelled on the faces of gods, to accompany the dead into the afterlife.





GREAT SPHINX OF GIZA. EGYP1 Built over 4,000 years ago

by the Ancient Egyptians, the Great Sphinx is a statue of a mythical creature that has a lion's body and a woman's head. According to legend, the Sphinx ate any person who failed to answer its riddle. Eek!
