## Seasons divide the year and bring about changes in the world around us.

Different seasons bring warm or cool weather; snow or extreme heat; wet, windy weeks or dry, dusty days; and even big weather events like super storms and twisting tornadoes. Some seasons have stretched-out days with lots of sunlight, while others have very little light and much shorter days.

Some cultures divide their year into six or more seasons that mark subtle changes in weather, but in certain tropical regions there are no more than two seasons: wet and dry. In most cities around the world the year is divided into four seasons: spring, summer, autumn and winter.

Throughout history people have welcomed new seasons with important rituals. Plenty of these traditions continue today, as changes in weather bring different occasions to celebrate and activities to enjoy all year round in many of the world's cities.
