


Cheetah cubs have amazing eyesight. When they are older, they will use their eyes to find food.




Octopuses do not have bones or a shell. Their soft bodies can squeeze into tiny spaces to hide or find food.

GREEN SEA

Green sea turtles spend most of their lives far out at sea. Here are a few things that help these reptiles live in the ocean.

Green sea turtles get their name from the green fat under their skin!

Fish help keep turtles clean by nibbling strange plants called algae off their shell!

Stick some fish near the turtle to help keep it clean!

> The sharp beak cuts and tears the seagrass and seaweed they eat.

Sea turtles even sleep in the water.

Sea turtles can swim with their eyes open.

Sea turtles

use their nostrils to breathe air like you. But they can hold their breath underwater for five hours.

A sea turtle's hard shell protects it from predators like sharks. The shell is made from scales that cover bone.

This reptile flaps its front flippers up and down to swim and dive.

Back flippers help them turn and stop.
